1. For online exhibit entries visit: **uinta.fairwire.com**
 - a. **Online Entries Due - Monday, July 15th 11:59 PM**
2. Refer to Livestock Checklist for individual species at uintacountyfair.org
3. The fairgrounds will be locked down from **Monday, July 22nd at 8:00 AM through Saturday, July 27th at 7:00 AM** for final set-up and preparations for the fair.
4. Livestock will be allowed on grounds as of **Saturday, July 27th at 7:00 AM**, at the owner's risk as the grounds will not be patrolled until **Monday, July 29th**.
5. All horses must be out of the horse barn and stalls cleaned out by **Tuesday, July 30th at 2:00 PM**. **After July 30th at 2:00 PM** stalls on the outside of the barn may be used during the fair on a first come first serve basis.
6. Sawdust is required to be used in all trays for rabbit and poultry cages.
7. All cages, stalls, and pens **MUST** be cleaned out 100% before the exhibitor may leave the grounds on **August 3rd by 4:00 PM**. This includes all decorations being removed.
8. An exhibitor must enter ALL animals that have been tagged with a Wyoming State Fair Tag and will no longer be required to declare online which two animals (per species) that will be brought to the fair. This ruling has been in place since the 2018 Uinta County Fair. The exhibitor must declare animals (per species) prior to entering the scales. The exhibitor will **ONLY** be allowed to weigh two animals in (per species). If one of the animals weighed-in is underweight, they may **NOT** trade or weigh another in its place.
9. Exhibitors please bring a copy of your online entry verification to track classes.
10. **The Fair Board has the right to disqualify any entry considered harmful to Fair attendees.**
11. **FFA/ 4H class Youth age as of January 1st of the current year. Jr = 8-10, Int = 11-13, Sr = 14-18, CloverBud 7 & under.**
12. **Open class Youth age as of January 1st of the current year:**
 - Children** (Open to Exhibitors 7 years and under as of Jan 1, fair year)
 - Juniors** (Open to Exhibitors 8 to 10 years old as of Jan 1, fair year)
 - Intermediate** (Open to Exhibitors 11 to 13 years as of Jan 1, fair year)
 - Seniors** (Open to Exhibitors 14-18 as of Jan 1, fair year)
 - Adults** (Open to Exhibitors 18 years and up old as of Jan 1, fair year)
 - Professionals** (Open to Exhibitors who sells, teaches, or otherwise earns income from said division)
13. **To align with State Fair guidelines the Uinta County Fair Board will no longer require health inspections at the Uinta County Fair. If you have a sick animal, it will be sent home.**

Beef Division Rules:

- 1. Livestock Fitting Rule:** The exhibiting youth **MUST** be in attendance and present with their project animal during the **ENTIRE** fitting process. The fitting process can be assisted and supervised by a volunteer, with the exhibitor doing as much of the process as their age, skill set and safety allows. Assistance is defined as a learning/educational situation where a Helper is educating/teaching the youth exhibitor techniques in fitting, showing, or care. It is important to employ common sense when working with livestock and youth, with the safety of all as the paramount focus.
- 2.** Youth age as of January 1st of the current year: Jr = 8-10, Int = 11-13, Sr = 14-18.

Items to Note:

- Bangs tags are required on all female bovines.
- Cow/Calf pairs will be penned in the equine barn.

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Beef Showmanship – Division 2.1

- Any 4-H or FFA Member is eligible. 4-H & FFA Members are allowed to help.
- Judging will be on the basis of contestant's ability to: 1-present their animal for judging including movement and positioning of the animal; 2-condition and cleanliness of the animal relating to being ready-to-show; 3-mannerisms and conduct of the showman.
- No boars, stallions, bucks, or bulls will be allowed in Showmanship classes.
- Members entering Showmanship MUST OWN, use their own animal and be carrying BEEF as their project.
- Disqualification for parental help in grooming is done before the class is judged.
- Showmanship must be pre-entered online by entry deadline.

Market Beef – Division 2.2

- Market Beef minimum weight is 1050 lbs.
- Beef MUST be born after January 1 of the previous year.
- Market Beef must be owned and tagged by February 1 of the current year.
- Market Beef must be taken home and feedback for 10 days following fair or until slaughter date set by buyer, whichever is earlier.
- Members MUST OWN their animal & be carrying BEEF as a project.
- There will be only one weigh-in per animal. No weight-backs.
- Market Beef MUST weigh-in Tuesday of fair week 8:30 AM-10:00 AM.
- Market Beef must be taken home and fed back by the exhibitor for 10 days following the fair.

Pen of Three Market Beef – Division 2.3

- No more than one pen per immediate family and/or one pen per club may enter this class.
- Only fair tagged market animals can make-up a pen. There must be exactly three animals in a pen.
- The animals will be brought into the show ring and animals in the pen will stand right beside each other.
- Each pen of three will be allowed one additional handler to help set up and exhibit the pen. All handlers must be 4-H or FFA members.
- Pens will be judged on overall appearance, uniformity and market animal quality. Also, showmanship, appearance and attitude of the exhibitors will be considered.
- This class must be pre-entered online by the entry deadline.
- Only enter ONE EXHIBITOR online to represent your PEN OF THREE.

General Rules and Regulations for Cats

1. The "Household Pet" cat is a mixed breed of unknown descent.
2. A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.
3. Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.
4. No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
5. All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
6. Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
7. Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
8. Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must provide a proper cage or carrier for their cats/kittens. Exhibitors must bring their own litter and litter box.
9. All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts allowed.

Health Requirements

- Cats must have current rabies and distemper shots. It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia.
- Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show. Health Certificates are required prior to entering the grounds. Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds.
- No cat or kitten may enter the show if there is any (feline) infectious or contagious disease in the household within 3 weeks prior to the show date.
- **Shot records must be attached to health inspection**

Items to Note:

- Exhibitors may only enter 2 animals per class. Each animal can only be entered in showmanship once, conformation once, and one fun class.

General Rule and Regulations for Dogs:

1. Only dogs entered in the show will be allowed on fairgrounds.
2. Any person observed abusing their dog in or out of the show ring, will be excused from the grounds.
3. Any dog posing a threat to either humans or other dogs will be excused from the grounds.
4. All dogs must have proof of current vaccinations including: rabies, Bordetella, distemper parvo.
***Shot records must be attached to health inspection**
5. All dogs must be on a leash (excluding competition) and under control at all times. Dogs must not be taken near the stock barns.
6. Once judging is completed, all dogs must be removed from the Fairgrounds.
7. Purebred dogs do not need to be registered.
8. All dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1st to compete at the state 4-H dog show, and at least 1 year old by May 1st for agility classes.
9. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 pts., may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
10. Judging of classes will follow 4-H Dog Show Guidelines.
11. Entries for Rally classes and Agility classes will need a current Wyoming 4-H Jump Height card at check-in to verify correct class entries.

- A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog with a total maximum of 2 entries (dogs). The first dog is referred to as “A” dog. The second is referred to as “B” dog for class entries.
- The first-year class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year beginner novice with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the first-year class only once.
- An exhibitor who competes in the A group with their 1st dog stays in the A group with that dog for each level. Members advance, from On Leash A to Novice A or from On Leash B to Novice B. The same is true for the B groups and levels.
- A 4-H handler with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H handler or Obedience Title must show the dog by these guidelines.
 - Junior/Intermediate 4-H'ers may move back or down one level.
 - Senior 4-H'ers must show the dog at the highest level it has achieved.
- A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at county fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H Members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- All exhibitors must enter/leave the show ring and compete with a 6 foot leash.
- Dogs soiling in the ring will be disqualified.
- Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.

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Dog Rally – Division 4.5

1. Eligible entries are identified by each county 4-H Educator.

NOVICE DOG: A dog competing which has not obtained three qualifying scores from competitions nor has a Rally title from another organization.

PRE-ADVANCED DOG: A dog which has received three qualifying scores as a Novice Dog but has not earned a qualifying score as an Advanced Dog.

ADVANCED DOG: A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competitions, received a score of at least 70 points in a Novice Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.

EXCELLENT DOG: A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competitions, received a score of at least 70 points in an Advanced Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.

RALLY ADVANCED EXCELLENT (RAE): After receiving three qualifying scores from competitions, the handler and dog move up to this level. At this level the handler and dog will compete in both Advanced Dog and Excellent Dog classes at the same show. The handler and dog must earn a qualifying score of 70 in each of the classes (Advanced and Excellent) to earn ribbons and or prizes. Handlers and dogs may show at this level indefinitely.

In referring to a horse's age, their birthday should be considered as being January 1 of the year in which they were born, and it then becomes a year old on January 1 of the following year. **For example:** a horse foaled any time during 2021 will be a yearling on Jan. 1, 2022 and a two-year old on Jan. 1, 2023.
8. The gate must be closed during speed events. (Time will start after the gate is closed.)
9. All 4-H members must have passed a Safety Certification test through 4-H for every event they are participating in with the horse they will be using for that event. Failure to pass a Safety Certification test will disqualify members from participation in that event.
10. Every horse shall be treated humanely and with dignity, respect, and compassion at all times.
11. All rules of the current Wyoming 4-H Horse RuleBook apply unless superseded by specific rules herein.
12. Unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated and offending exhibitors will forfeit premiums and may immediately be dismissed from the Fairgrounds.
13. Members will only be able to enter a class two times with different horses. Only one set of points per class would be used to determine the High Points Award.
14. High Points Awards will be figured on the rider, not the horse. Blue – 3 pts/Red – 2 pts/White – 1pt. High points are given for juniors, intermediates, and seniors. Halter class will not count towards the high point award.
15. Members will not need to show in order of age (junior, intermediate, and senior) during Speed Events.
16. Exhibit's name will be announced a maximum of three times before the exhibitor is scratched from that class.
17. Mares and Geldings will run at the same time. If you have multiple horses in the arena -- Line up another 4-H or FFA member to show your extra horses.

4. All horses 38" to 48" must exhibit in the pony class.
5. If horses are exhibited in the green driving they cannot exhibit in the small horse or pony driving classes.
6. If horses are exhibited in the green driving obstacles they cannot exhibit in the small horse or pony driving obstacle classes.
7. Youth cannot have helpers in the ring with them to exhibit their horse except in liberty, costume or special needs classes.
8. Special needs classes are designed for youth with physical or mental challenges that warrant assistance from either a 4-H/FFA member or adult to complete the competition.
9. High Points Awards will be figured on the rider, not the horse. Blue – 3 pts/Red – 2 pts/White – 1pt. High points are given for juniors, intermediates, and seniors. Halter class will not count towards the high point award.
10. Exhibitors must choose between either regular or special needs classes.
11. Music for the mini horse show must be in CD format.
12. Exhibitors must provide their own cart for driving classes.

7:30 AM – 10:00 AM

Interview judging brings the 4-H members and judges together to evaluate project exhibits. It provides a unique opportunity for 4-H exhibitors to learn from the experiences and knowledge of the evaluator, as well as receive positive one-on-one feedback on the progress made during the year. The exhibitor and the judge should talk directly to each other to share information and evaluate the project.

Exhibitor's names must be written on the clipboards by 9:30 a.m. or they may forfeit the ability to submit their entries.

General Information and Rules

1. Tags may be picked up the day of judging at the information table by the Fair Office, if not picked up prior to the fair.
2. Interview Check-in will be with the clerks at the schedule table in the back of the Exhibit Hall. Members should check-in upon arrival so the clerks know they are available for judging.
3. Members will be called to meet with a judge as soon as one is ready for each exhibit. Members will meet with a different judge for most projects and may have several different meetings. All exhibits will be judged as quickly as possible.
4. As members finish with each judge, they will return to the waiting area outside the Exhibit Hall.
5. Only one adult may accompany the member to the judging station, if the member chooses. They must remain quietly by the member until the interview is over. If there is a question or clarification needed, adults may speak briefly to the judge at the conclusion of the interview.
6. Any adult the superintendents feel is interfering in the interview process or attempting to influence placement will be asked to leave and will not be permitted in the future.
7. If young family members come to the judging, please make arrangements for babysitting outside the hall, as they will not be allowed inside.

Interview judging between the member and judge is a valuable learning experience. The Fair Board, Extension staff and superintendents will do everything possible to keep the atmosphere quiet and conducive to further learning.

All entries are due online by Monday, July 15th at 11:59 PM.

- **Any live animal needing to be entered after this deadline will be charged \$50 per entry up to the close of set weigh-in time for that market animal species, the start time of the breeding livestock, or horse show being entered in.**
- **After notifying show superintendent, classes entered incorrectly may be switched within the same division prior to the start of livestock show, horse show, or static exhibit judging.**

- Name of product, process used, processing time, pressure it was canned at, and how long it was pressured.
- Exhibit bottles with rings.
- All exhibits must indicate date canned on the label and must be product of the August of last Fair Year to this Fair Year.
 - **Preserves** are made from whole fruits
 - **Conserve** is made from fruit with nuts, raisins, etc.
 - **Marmalade** is made with citrus fruits.
 - **Jelly** is made from juice.
- Jellies must be in small canning jars NOT sealed with paraffin. Jellies do not need to be water bathed.
- All Butters, Conserves, Jams, Marmalades, Preserves, Pickles, Relishes and Sauces must be in standard jars with lids and must be processed in a boiling water bath for the recommended time in each recipe. Frozen products will not be accepted because of spoilage problems.
- Canned fruit and vegetables must be in standard one-pint or one-quart jars (NO MAYONNAISE JARS, etc.) and must be processed in a boiling water bath or pressure cooker for recommended time in each recipe.
- For dried and leather products, please label as to what type of meat, fruit or vegetable was used in each product.
- Judges may open jars if placing is close.
- Jellies, jams, marmalades, preserves, and pickles will be opened for judging.
- The Fair Board has the right to disqualify any entry considered harmful to Fair attendees.

****The USDA "Complete Guide to Canning" December 2009 will be used to determine the correct processing times for all home-canned food items.**

The object of food preservation is to preserve food in a safe and wholesome manner. This Fair Board supports the USDA and has adopted the 1989 USDA standard times and processing methods as the way to preserve food properly. All jars must be labeled with processing methods and times to be properly judged. Any jars not properly labeled must be disqualified. At the Uinta County Fair, we assume all canning is done at altitudes of 6,000 to 8,000 feet. If the canning is not done at this elevation, the altitude should be specified so proper canning times can be judged.

Judges are encouraged to judge first on preservation methods and secondly on appearance. Judging on taste is optional as the tasting of improperly canned foods can be dangerous. This includes pickles and relishes which can be a problem if there is an improper balance of food and vinegar. No low acid foods such as meats and vegetables will ever be tasted, as we do not have facilities to boil the food.

The Superintendent in charge of this department shall have the right to remove from the display, at any time, exhibits or parts of exhibits which become unsightly. All flowers will be judged for freshness, cleanliness, arrangements, size, color, stem, form, substance and foliage.
- **IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONS:** Select flowers that are coming into full bloom – NOT flowers that are already in full bloom. If a flower is to remain fresh throughout the exhibit period it must be cut no later than the day before it is to be exhibited. It is generally recognized that afternoon cutting is advisable, especially later in the afternoon, since at that time the greatest amount of sugar is in the leaves. As soon as the flowers are placed in water, they take up enough to overcome any apparent wilting. Placing stems in water 110 degrees is usually best; after which, specimens should be placed in a cool room until the water comes to room temperature.
- Flower stems should be cut cleanly at an angle with a sharp knife or pruning shears and placed at once in deep water. It is a good practice to carry a bucket of clean water to the garden when flowers are cut and place each specimen in the water at once. After cutting and hot water treatment, add ice to the water. The flower material is ready to be placed in a cool, dark place overnight. This is called “hardening.” Flowers prepared in this way improve their substance and they will hold their freshness for a longer time.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All exhibits MUST BE PRE REGISTERED.
2. There will be entry fees on JUNIOR RODEO. Entry fees must accompany entry blanks to be accepted.
3. All livestock information must be submitted online by entry deadline including the CORRECT Wyoming State Fair 15 digit RFID tag number, Scrapie tag number, and animal description or the entry will be considered incomplete and void.
4. No article exhibited at a previous Uinta County Fair and winning a prize will be eligible for exhibit. Articles must have been made within the past two (2) years.
5. To participate in the Jr. Show, exhibitors must be 4-H or FFA members in good standing of Uinta County and the exhibit must be made and owned by the exhibitor or family member.
6. Exhibits must be in place by the time designated for them or they cannot be entered. All exhibits, except horses, dogs, cats and breeding animals must remain until **Saturday, 4:00 PM, August 3rd**. Exhibitors removing exhibits before release time will forfeit all premiums and/or be banned from participation at the Uinta County Fair.
7. Exhibit Hall will be closed to the public for judging on **Saturday, July 27th**. It will remain closed to the public until ready for display.
8. Exhibits may only be entered in the Division & Class listed in the premium list. Livestock exhibitors may have two entries or individuals per class. Exhibits which do not fall into any division listed will not be judged.
9. Any question, concern, or consideration concerning the exhibit hall or exhibit hall exhibits should be addressed to the Fair Board Member in charge of the exhibit hall.
10. All animals and articles entered shall be classified under the appropriate division and shall be under the control of the division superintendent.
11. Superintendents in each department are required to take charge of articles belonging to their department upon arrival & see that they are arranged in their proper place. Exhibitors are required to cooperate with them and place tagged articles as directed.
12. The Fair Board will take precautions for the safekeeping of exhibits, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage. Exhibitors must give personal attention to the removal of their articles at the end of the fair. Those exhibits that are not picked up Saturday, August 3rd will be kept at the Fair Office, and after two weeks will be discarded.
13. Any lost and found items or entries not picked up within two weeks after the fair will be discarded or donated.
14. The Fair Board reserves the right to prorate the available premium money if necessary. Premium money will be paid on purple, blue, red and white ribbons, in the 4-H & FFA; and blue, red and white ribbons in open class.
15. Exhibits will be judged on the Danish System. Each exhibit will receive a blue, red or white ribbon. Grand and Reserve Champions will be awarded at the judge's discretion.

16. No exhibit shall receive a premium unless deemed worthy by the judge, though it may be the only one of its kind entered. If unworthy of a first prize it may be awarded second or third on the decision of the judge.
17. **All premiums not picked up in person one week after fair ends by 4:00 PM will be forfeited as per: Wyoming State Treasurer' Office 04/2018.**
18. A veterinarian will be available to the fair and his/her word will be final for the health of any animal. Any exhibitor requesting to remove any animal suspected of illness from the fairgrounds, prior to scheduled release time, will be required to obtain such authorization from a certified veterinarian at the owner's expense. Sick animals may be removed from the fairgrounds in the best interest of the animal and exhibitors.
19. A separate health inspection form is required for each and every exhibitor.
20. A project done in school should be eligible for display or show through one, but only one organization. The member should be enrolled in this project during the current year. The organization should be chosen by the youth members.
21. In June, 1982, the 1940 agreement between the Wyoming State Department of Vocational Education and the Wyo. Cooperative Extension Service involving 4-H and FFA youth was reviewed and amended to read as follows: "If a boy or girl is enrolled in both 4-H and Vo Ag or Home Economics, work done must be different in each. For example: 4-H or FFA members may carry the same type of supervised occupational experience program in Vo Ag or as a 4-H project, but the exhibit must be different in each. The FFA exhibit must come from a supervised FFA program and the 4-H exhibit must come from a 4-H project.
22. No cats or dogs allowed on the fairgrounds except for those entered in the dog, cat or pet show. All show dogs must be on a leash.
23. Random drug testing may occur with all market livestock. Any project members exhibiting animals that test positive to drugs will forfeit their premium and be banned from participation at the Uinta County Fair.
24. Animals exhibited in a Jr. Division market class cannot exhibit in a breeding class.
25. The Uinta County Fair Board reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily to settle and determine all matters and differences that arise.
26. NO animals will be allowed on grounds during the 10 days of Fair except those entered in Fair by the deadline. No overnighting or additional animals will be allowed due to limited space and safety of fairgoers. NO EXCEPTIONS
27. The fairgrounds will be locked down from **Monday, July 22nd at 8:00 AM through Saturday, July 27th at 7:00 AM** for final set-up and preparations for the fair.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

4-H CLUBS and FFA CHAPTERS – LIVESTOCK INFORMATION, RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All youth exhibitors (4-H/FFA) exhibiting in the Jr. Division of the Uinta County Fair, must be enrolled & carrying that particular project for the given year.
2. OWNERSHIP: Market Beef must be owned and tagged by February 1st. Market Sheep, Market Goats, and Market Hogs must be owned and tagged by June 1st. Meat Pen Rabbits and Poultry must be owned by June 15th.
3. Classes for 4-H and FFA only are so marked.
4. Official dress for the FFA Members will be FFA jacket, white shirt, tie (or scarf for girls), black dress pants, and black dress shoes or boots. 4-H members should dress in long sleeved shirts, dark pants, and boots or dress shoes. Jackets and neckties are optional.
5. Junior Division (4-H and FFA) members must accompany and exhibit their own market livestock personally, but in case they need help they may have another Junior Division (4-H or FFA) member show their animals with prior approval from the superintendent of that livestock show. Any violation of this will be grounds for disqualification.
6. While in the show ring, the person showing the animal must do so without aid, excluding pens of three. All adults, except those qualified to be in the show ring, must remain outside the show ring while the show is underway.
7. **Livestock Fitting Rule:** The exhibiting youth **MUST** be in attendance and present with their project animal during the **ENTIRE** fitting process. The fitting process can be assisted and supervised by a volunteer, with the exhibitor doing as much of the process as their age, skill set and safety allows. Assistance is defined as a learning/educational situation where a Helper is educating/teaching the youth exhibitor techniques in fitting, showing, or care. It is important to employ common sense when working with livestock and youth, with the safety of all as the paramount focus.
8. Due to limited pen space, each exhibitor will be allowed one pen for each market animal species entered, for penning up to 2 animals. If there are less than 2 animals in any species entered, that animal will be combined with other club or family member's exhibits of the same species.
9. All exhibitors are required to keep alleys and stalls clean at all times per ADA requirements.
10. Any animal inadvertently entered in the wrong class may be assigned to the correct class up to the day prior to judging.

- 11.** Market Beef must be born after January 1, 2024. Market Lamb, Swine, and Goats must be born after January 1, 2024. Market Poultry must be born after March 1, 2024. Market Rabbits must be born after April 1, 2024.
- 12.** You must conform to ALL General Rules & Regulations.
- 13.** Market animal weigh-ins will be as follows on **Tuesday, July 30th** :
 - a.** Livestock Barn scale
 - i.** Swine 7:30-9:30,
 - ii.** Lambs 9:30-11:00
 - b.** Beef Barn scale
 - i.** Goats 7:30-8:30
 - ii.** Beef 8:30-10:00
 - c.** Poultry Barn scale
 - i.** Rabbits/Poultry 11:00
- 14.** All sheep and goats must have scrapie identification in the ears prior to entering the fairgrounds.
- 15.** Muzzle use will be allowed for lambs and goats. Signs will be created explaining why it is safe for these to be used, and these will be available for any exhibitor to post directly above their animals that will be muzzled, for transparency and understanding of animal husbandry to the public.
- 16.** The Uinta County Fair Board and its designated personnel shall not tolerate any cruelty to any animal while on the Fairgrounds. Any violator or violation will be dealt with appropriately.
- 17.** Separate animals must be used in 4-H and FFA showmanship.
- 18.** Breeding livestock may only show once individually and once in a group. Open class and youth breeding classes will be shown simultaneously in the show ring, thus an animal may only be entered or shown once in open or once in a youth class.
- 19.** Only 2 animals per class allowed per exhibitor in all livestock shows.
- 20.** All market animals must be completely healed from banding or castration before the date of health inspection.
- 21.** Market Beef must be taken home and fed back by the exhibitor for 10 days following the fair.



GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

4-H AND FFA JR LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

1. The Livestock sale is open to active 4-H and FFA members in good standing ONLY.
2. Animals must be a 4-H or FFA project of the current year and so verified by 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor.
3. One weight taken for show weight at weigh-in will be Sale Weight; no other weight will be taken.
4. All exhibition swine entering Wyoming must be accompanied by an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) or "Health Certificate."
5. Private treaty sale arrangements are strictly forbidden on grounds.
6. A brand inspection where required or bill of sale must be turned in with the sale declaration to the fair office.
7. All Market Lambs must be shorn within 30 days of the County Fair. No wet lambs with jackets will be weighed.
8. All market animals must have received a Red Ribbon or better to sell. No White Ribbon animals will be sold through the auction.
9. SALE LIMITATION: Grand & Reserve Champions market animals must sell. In the event that an exhibitor receives more than one Champion or Reserve in any two species, that exhibitor will be allowed to sell both animals.
10. Exhibitors with more than one market animal MUST NOTIFY the Fair Office immediately after animals are judged as to which animal they wish to sell. NO EXCEPTIONS.
11. Exhibitors must be present and prepared to sell their own animal at the time set in sale order.
12. While in the sale ring all exhibitors shall wear appropriate attire. Shorts or open toed shoes will not be allowed.
13. All animals in the sale must sell. No sellers can have a "no sale".
14. All 4-H and FFA Livestock members will personally contact prospective buyers and encourage participation.
15. 4-H and FFA members selling animals through the sale agree that before payment will be made to them, they will write a "Thank You" letter to each individual buyer of their animal, place the letter in a stamped envelope addressed to the buyer, with seller's return address and deliver it to the Fair Board Office. This rule MUST be complied with, even if you present your buyer with a hand delivered thank you. Thank you letters are due to the fair office on or before September 1st. 4-H and FFA members who do not send thank you letters to their buyers, or who send letters past the September 1st deadline as specified above will have to make a formal appeal, in person, to the Fair Board to be considered for future participation in the Livestock Sale. **For the convenience of the buyers and respect of other exhibitors and the buyers, we encourage any optional buyer gifts to be delivered to them at a later date.**

16. All sale receipts will go into the general fund and sellers will be paid as soon as **ALL** receipts have been collected and sellers have turned in their thank you letters.
17. Market Beef must be taken home and fed back by the exhibitor for 10 days following the fair.
18. If any animal is going to the State Fair, the exhibitor must indicate so on the required declaration form before the sale so it can be clearly designated in the sale book for buyers to know before purchasing the animal. **Any state fair animal marked as re-sale will be the seller's responsibility to pay the resale price, if the resale buyer does not want the animal. The resale buyer has first right of refusal to the animal. Buyer CAN NOT have the animal till after the state fair.**
19. A 4% Sale Commission will be charged to pay sale expenses.
20. All market animals will be sold according to how they are placed in the market weight show.
21. WEIGHTS:
 - a. Market Beef - Minimum weight 1050 lbs.
 - b. Market Hogs - Minimum weight 200 lbs.
 - c. Market Lambs - Minimum weight 100 lbs.
 - d. Market Goats - Minimum weight 55 lbs.
 - e. Meat Pen Rabbits - Minimum weight 3 lbs.
 - f. Meat Pen Chickens - Minimum weight 3.5 lbs.
22. Animals will be released to the packers at the discretion of the sale committee. Packers will load first and then the resale buyers next.
23. All market animals must be fed, watered, and bedded Friday after the sale, and again on Saturday. Each exhibitor is responsible to see what arrangements are made for their animal, from the Livestock Sale Committee on Saturday before 1 p.m.
24. The following U.S. Department of Agriculture wholesale meat act applies to the sale of market livestock sold at the Uinta County Fair:
 - a. Animals must be in good health and free of drug or chemical residue.
 - b. Antibiotics and sulfonamide have required withdrawal periods.
 - c. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
25. If drugs or other chemical residues are found in the carcasses of animals sold through this sale, neither Uinta County, the Fair Board nor the Livestock Sale Committee will be liable or responsible for carcass condition or sale price of animal.
26. Exhibitors will **ONLY** be allowed to weigh two animals in (per species). The weight recorded at the scale will be used as the show and sale weight for each animal. If one of the animals weighed-in is underweight, they may **NOT** trade or weigh another in its place.

*****Violation of these rules will be dealt with by the Livestock Sale Committee on an individual basis. Fees or consequences may be assessed.**

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

JUDGES

- 1.** Every effort is expended to provide competent and qualified judges. No exhibitor or spectator will be allowed to interfere with a judge in the performance of their duties.
- 2.** Exhibitors must arrange for the prompt showing of all exhibits at the call of the judge. At the judge's discretion any exhibit not presented promptly when called may be disqualified.
- 3.** The decision of the judge shall be final and no appeal will be considered except in cases of formal protest. At the judge's discretion, they are not required to place any class not deemed worthy.
- 4.** Objection to any person serving as a judge must be submitted to Fair Management in writing prior to his making an award; giving good and sufficient reason therefore, and upon which the Management shall have the full power to act.

PROTESTS

- 1.** A committee consisting of Fair Board Members will hear protests and suggestions.
- 2.** All formal protests must be submitted in writing, be signed, and be accompanied by \$100 cash or certified check per protestor (refundable if protest is sustained). The protest must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Fair Board President immediately after the occasion for the protest. A protest pertaining to eligibility must be submitted prior to judging.
- 3.** No one may approach superintendents, volunteers, or staff with fair complaints of any sort. These concerns must be taken directly to a Fair Board member with the required \$100 protest fee in hand. If this process isn't followed correctly, the offending party will be dismissed from the fairgrounds.
- 4.** Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. Depending on the basis of the protest, interested parties may be notified and given the opportunity to submit evidence. A decision may be withheld until a complete investigation can be made. No complaint or appeal that a judge overlooked an entry will be considered.
